
Landing a Competitive Internship in Washington, D.C.

Your story had really inspired me to become more proactive and ambitious with my internship search, so I thought I would share my story with you. I was browsing YouTube one day that I had come across a user comment that had mentioned your book and said that it had everything a student would need to know about searching for internships. So I took a chance and I bought your book from Amazon and started to use it to aid my search for an internship in Washington D.C.

Since my school operates on the quarter system instead of the semester system, I had a difficult time searching for a spring internship that would accommodate my schedule. Consequently, I felt as if I had a lot of things riding against me, especially given the fact that I was applying so late. Last week, I decided to send out my last wave of applications at 1am on Monday...

...(so that I know the internship coordinator would see my application first thing in the morning) to certain internship sites that students from my school had gone to in the past.

When I awakened Monday morning at 9am, I had checked my inbox and found that 3 organizations had emailed me to schedule an interview. COHA specifically asked if I could give them a call that Monday before 2pm EST. Since I live on the west coast, 2pm EST time translates into 11am PST, so I had less than 2 hours to prepare for a phone interview.

I had called the director of COHA, and he had requested that I research the organization a bit morebefore making another call to speak with him again. After that phone call, I did exactly everything that he had instructed me to do. I had worked hard to research this internship organization to better prepare me for my next talk with the director.

Two days later I call the director of COHA again for another phone interview. And again, he gave the same speech about researching the organization a bit more and after he was done, I told him that all the research that I had done since I had last spoken with him. Using advice from your book, I listed a few reasons why I believed that this internship was the right match for me and how I would be suited to work towards the organization's goals. After I finished my pitch, he was so impressed with my efforts and my presentation skills that he decided to bypass the second evaluation stage and he offered me the position right on the spot. So within 48 hours after sending out my application, I had landed one of my top choice internships.

And get this, they accept 24 interns in their program and they only had one spot left open --- and I got it!

COHA is an extremely competitive Washington D.C. based internship. I had read somewhere that for every one spot there are 10 vying applications for it, but since I was proactive, thanks to Learn to Intern CEO Style, I applied to COHA and took advantage of the chance to showcase myself to them in the best possible way.

I do believe that all your advice on searching for an internship had really helped me land a competitive internship in such a short period of time (it's so surreal...I still can't completely believe that it happened the way it did). Certainly I had the background and the skill base ready, but your book had really helped me present myself in such a way that appealed to a potential employer.
